From the Chairman

When I attended the National Conference at the end of August (you should try it next year) I went to a workshop, "Building A Learning Community". This, I discovered, was all about one or more U3As joining together to do some 'research'. Sometimes an outside body e.g. heritage centre, charity, museum is also involved.

My heart sank at the thought of getting involved in some big project and trying to enthuse our members. (Don't stop reading, it gets better!)

What I learned was the Shared Learning Project, which is what they are called, can be short term and should last for a few months only. An example was given of a walking group that undertook a 'Bee Count' during its walks. This was in conjunction with a Conservation Trust. Another example was of a 'Glow Worm Count' completed by a U3A in Norfolk. I was encouraged by knowing that projects can be a simple as that!

Now, **U3A** will be **40** years old in **2020** and TAT has suggested that U3As/ Networks consider a project (SLP) looking at our High Streets and how they have changed over the last 40 years. I wonder if any of the groups in Charnwood U3A would be interested in doing something like that? Different interest groups could be involved: History, Local History, Photography, Science, Walking, Writing, Archaeology, Architecture, Painting to name a few.

One suggestion to help was to create a 'closed Facebook' page where people could upload their contributions which would be collated to create a final presentation for our town - or our County if several U3As are involved via the Network.

What do you think? Would you like to be involved? I think it could be fun. Let me know.

On another subject, and I don't apologise for repetition: next March we will need new Committee members. You will need to appoint a new Chairman, a new Secretary and at least one new Committee member.

This is your U3A and it will only keep going if we have a Committee and Officers to comply with our Constitution and the Charity Commissioners.

If you are interested in finding out more about joining the Committee please speak to me or to our Secretary, David (contact details on the last page of this newsletter).

Serving on the committee means being part of a team and working together. Being a committee member is not a long service award. We need newer members to bring fresh ideas. If you're in a group, speak to new people and encourage them to get involved. It's an interesting and satisfying role to be part of the committee.



Now to Beacon, our new administrative system:

We are inviting group leaders to come along to be trained on the system. Several of you have already completed the training and we will be announcing dates for October and November training to all those group leaders who have yet to train. Those who have completed the training have found the session helpful and encouraging and the system is straightforward to use once you are 'logged on'. It will simplify keeping records, emailing your members and listing your meetings.

Our renewals have been managed with the Beacon system this year and I hope you have all been able to renew your membership without too much difficulty. Yes, we have had one or two teething problems but we have good support from the Beacon Team at Charnwood and from the Beacon Buddy assigned to us by the administrators. One advantage of the system is that when we have a change of personnel, all the information is stored and will be there for the new person - so no lost information.

I trust you have all had a relaxing summer and are ready to take part in U3A activities this autumn. I look forward to speaking to you at our monthly meetings.

8th January: Paul Newsham was a hit last year with his first talk to us and so he is on the list for a return on a totally different subject – "What my mother and father used to say". I think we can guess how that will go!

12th February: Rosalind Smith will talk about the formation of 3M in America and how it came to Loughborough, what a multi-facetted company it is and what is its philosophy and I think members will find it interesting.

11th March: is the AGM and this year I am delighted that our very own music group has agreed to entertain us.



8th April: Mark Walsh is a regular contributor to "Friday night is Music Night" on BBC radio and has a host of tales to tell about working with Danny La Rue, June Whitfield and others. He is a fine ukulele player and will delight with his music as well as his stories.



13th May: A member recommendation. Karen Slade gave up teaching to form The Company of Artisans in Melton Mowbray in 2008. They showcase historic building crafts with tiles a speciality - apparently the Duke of Rutland is a major collector. When in costume for her demonstrations Karen becomes Kate Tiler.

8th July: A member recommendation. Dragonflies are the essence of summer and a source of beauty and inspiration. They are some of the largest insects alive today: masters of the air and supreme predators. This is a 'light' introduction to the lifecycle of these fascinating and captivating insects and uses many of Kevin's own photographs.

12th August: Philip Caine is the author of 6 Jack Castle adventure novels and has a colourful life story to tell - from the hotel industry via the North Sea oil rigs to Kazakhstan, Russia, Iraq and Dubai.

9th September: Jane Futcher volunteers for the Leslie Edwards Trust (who organise classes in Loughborough for the hearing-impaired) and advises people, mainly our age, on strategies for dealing with deteriorating hearing. She will probably also include a workshop session on lip-reading.

July: Buxton and Whaley Bridge

In July we visited Buxton and Whaley Bridge – with afternoon tea on the canal. (Yes that Whaley Bridge!)

As seems to be typical for our 2019 trips, shortly after we arrived in Buxton we were greeted by a heavy downpour of rain. Many of us made straight for one of the many tea and coffee shops, where if you were lucky you could see one of various groups of Morris dancers demonstrating their skills. There were many groups dancing in different parts of the town, some dressed in the traditional white and others even more exuberantly (see picture, right).

After a reviving drink we explored the beautiful town of Buxton. There are many interesting buildings to look at as



well as lots of quirky shops. Many of us managed also to take a look at the Pavilion Gardens.

In the afternoon most of us went on to Whaley Bridge where we had a cruise on the canal boat "The Judith Mary II" (see picture, left). By this time the weather was dry and bright, the boat crew were friendly and the afternoon tea was excellent and very large - doggy bags were offered. The view from the boat was both scenic and interesting.

We would certainly not have been able to take the trip if we had been a couple of weeks later. Our best wishes go out to those whose lives and businesses have been disrupted by the recent problems with the dam.

August: Castle Howard

Our destination in August was Castle Howard. Unbeknownst to us (and they did subsequently apologise) we booked our trip for the same weekend as the BBC was filming Country File in the fields adjacent to the Castle. This did put somewhat of a strain on the local roads – so our route was a little roundabout and we approached Castle Howard from the North.

We all enjoyed the lovely interiors of the Castle – made even better by the very friendly and informative guides. The grounds, with its formal gardens and fountain were also a delight.

We saw a lot of people, in very muddy boots, who were combining a trip to the Country File filming with a visit to Castle Howard.

September: Hughenden Manor

In September we visited Hughenden Manor – the home of Benjamin Disraeli.

Much smaller than Castle Howard, this was also a very interesting house to look around. It told the story of both a hugely significant Prime Minister and the great alliance between Disraeli and his wife Mary Anne Lewis – a moneyed widow twelve years his senior. What appeared to have started as a marriage of convenience ended as a true partnership.

The House is set in glorious countryside and we were all able to enjoy the views. There are also formal and kitchen gardens to enjoy – all in great weather (see picture, right).


