# More on Our Monthly Meetings


#### **Our Previous Speaker**

Also on **7th January**, at **2 pm**, **Science & Technology 1** are holding a Zoom meeting when John Bell will offer '**An introduction to Vaccinology**, a **Cinderella science to save the world**'.

Penicillin miraculously saved uncountable lives in WW2. Faced with SARS Cov-2 it is powerless. In 2020 the world has turned to the Cinderella science of vaccinology for salvation.

This presentation will trace the emergence of the science of vaccines from a 19th century physician's courageous development of a defence

against smallpox, through the discovery of the structure of DNA in Cambridge by Watson & Crick, the subsequent disentanglement of the mechanism of inheritance, and understanding of the code of life.

The science underpins President Trump's (and a million others) warp speed programmes, resulting in new 21st century mRNA vaccines. The journey involves visiting the immune system, virus and bacteria, how vaccines are made, and what is DNA and mRNA. The current major players, the Oxford AstraZeneca, the BioNTec-Pfizer and Moderna vaccines will be discussed, and what the future might hold.

# **Covid Vaccinations - Important Information**

We have been advised of the following plea from NHS staff:

'Please, please, please, make sure you or your family find your NHS number and that you have a copy of it immediately to hand for when you are called for the Covid jab. From the staff on the front line this is far and away the biggest bottleneck when it comes to administering the vaccine to as many people as quickly as possible.'

According to the government website, when it is the right time for you, you will receive an invitation to come forward and told where to go and what to do. For most people this will be a letter, either from their GP or the national NHS.

This letter will include all the information you will need to book appointments, including your NHS number. When you book, you will need:

- · your name and date of birth
- your NHS number

If you want to look up your NHS number see https://www.nhs.uk/using-the-nhs/about-the-nhs/what-is-an-nhs-number/

Alternatively, If you are unable to access this site, your number will be included on any recent prescription, hospital letter, etc.

An NHS number is a 10-digit number, like 485 777 3456.

# **Warning: Covid Vaccination Scam**

We are aware that some people are receiving fraudulent calls and text messages offering the COVID-19 vaccination. In some cases, people are asked to press a number on their keypad or to send a text message to confirm they wish to receive the vaccine. Doing so is likely to result in a charge being applied to their phone bill. In other cases, callers are offering the vaccine for a fee or asking for bank details.

#### People are warned to be alert to these scams.

The vaccine is only available from the NHS and the NHS will contact you when it is your turn. At present, appointments are only being offered to the public over 80 years old.

The NHS will NEVER ask you to press a button on your keypad or send a text to confirm you want the vaccine, and NEVER ask for payment or for your bank details.

If you receive a call you believe to be fraudulent, hang up. If you believe you have been the victim of fraud or identity theft you should report this directly to Action Fraud on 0300 123 2040.
