Time now to be looking forward. Following their summer recesses, I think all interest groups are now meeting again and, national disasters permitting, Monthly Meeting will be back this month!



View From The Committee (Part 3):

WHY I JOINED THE COMMITTEE

I was told that unless Cu3a had enough committee members, it would have to close down, according to Charity Commission Law. I put myself forward because I wanted to keep Cu3a going.

WHAT ARE THE LEGAL REQUIREMENTS?

As a member of Charnwood u3a Committee, you are a trustee of a charity. This is a privilege and a responsibility and requires common sense. Legal requirements of a charity trustee are:-

- 1. Ensure your charity is carrying out its purpose.
- 2. Comply with its governing document and the law.
- 3. Act in the charity's best interests.
- 4. Ensure the charity is accountable.
- 5. Manage the charity's resources responsibly.
- 6. Act with reasonable care and skill.

HOW I JOINED THE COMMITTEE

I went as a guest to a committee meeting. I then completed and submitted an application form, supported by a proposer and seconder. At the AGM, when my name was announced, I stood up, smiled, and was voted onto the committee.

WHAT I DO ON THE COMMITTEE

Before each meeting, I read the Minutes of the last meeting and check whether they are according to my notes and memory. I read the reports of the various role-holders (Business Secretary, Beacon Administrator, Groups Coordinator, and so on). I attend Committee meetings from 10 until 12 on the second Wednesday morning each month in John Storer House, where I listen to the reports and am free to comment and participate in discussion of agenda items and any other business. I vote on all the proposals, whether to accept, vote against or abstain. Anyone can decide whether or not to pick up any additional tasks.

Please consider joining the Committee, because if there is no committee, then Charnwood u3a ceases to exist. My background is Mathematics and Computing and I have used these skills in schools and colleges in both teaching and in administration, having been an exams officer, in charge of all the exam entries in school, and as a timetabler in the Computing Department at Leicester College.

One former committee member, way back in 2013, said to me, "You are good with computers, we need a new Membership Secretary, how about it?" Thanks to Keith Harrold I have been in this role since March 2014 (he has a lot to answer for).

Lots of changes have been implemented since then; renewals were all done by cheque but thankfully, BACS payments were introduced in 2016. This means that we will save £300 in bank charges for cheque deposits which were introduced last November. Registration at the Main Monthly meeting used to be a case of finding your name amongst 1000 and placing a tick by it, but bar codes on the membership card were introduced in 2018 to make life simpler, provided the scanner works.

I do enjoy the work, though sometimes you do have to be a detective. A few examples:

- A cheque comes through without any paperwork and the name on the cheque is the daughter's name which is not the same as the member's name.
- A BACS payment has a reference which could be one of two members.
- A member emails me that they haven't received the renewal email, but the email address is different to the one in the database.

The one funny aspect is that the postman thinks I must be some form of celebrity, getting 50-80 letters a day during September. It's just my fan mail, I keep on saying.



Days of Interest September Trip

Our September trip took us into Yorkshire. Our first stop was at the Yorkshire Sculpture Park, a chance to see modern sculpture set within a fantastic landscape on a pleasantly sunny day. Many of us decided to join a short introductory



tour, during which a very knowledgeable volunteer showed us some of the highlights, ranging from the exuberant red "Love" sculpture (pictured left), a delicate cast bronze tree hung with shiny apples (pictured below) to a group of granite sculptures called "Amoeba" which cried out to be touched. The visit also prompted many discussions about the merits of modern art and sculpture in the landscape.

In the afternoon we moved on to Nostell, a National Trust property. Again this was set in a beautiful landscape, and we were able to enjoy both the formal gardens and the parkland as well as the house itself – not forgetting the café. The house was

interesting, including a very large dolls house, which was not designed or used as a toy but as a means by which women were encouraged to learn how to run a country house and practise social etiquette. Latterly it may even have been used to experiment with room designs – an early mood board?

Friends of Charnwood Museum

Thursday 13th October: Charles Frederick Ball, from Loughborough to Gallipoli

Charles Frederick Ball (1879-1915), was born and brought up in Loughborough and carved out a distinguished career for himself as a botanist and horticulturist, ending up as Assistant Keeper at the Royal Botanic Gardens in Dublin. Tragically, his life ended prematurely when he enlisted in the Royal Dublin Fusiliers on the outbreak of WW1 and was killed at Gallipoli in 1915.

Speaker Brian Willan is a grandson of Fred Ball's wife Alice (via her second marriage) and draws upon recently discovered family letters and photographs, as well as research in other archives, to tell his fascinating story – and that of Alice too.

To Autumn

Season of mists and mellow fruitfulness,
Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;
Conspiring with him how to load and bless
With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run;
To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees,
And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;
To swell the gourd, and plump the hazel shells
With a sweet kernel; to set budding more,
And still more, later flowers for the bees,
Until they think warm days will never cease.

For summer has o'er-brimm'd their clammy cells.

Who hath not seen thee oft amid thy store?
Sometimes whoever seeks abroad may find
Thee sitting careless on a granary floor,

Among the river sallows, borne aloft
Or sinking as the light wind lives or dies;
And full-grown lambs loud bleat from hilly bourn;
Hedge-crickets sing; and now with treble soft
The red-breast whistles from a garden-croft;
And gathering swallows twitter in the skies.
