Last month, we were treated to an interesting insight into the important role of sleep in our lives, in a talk given by Cu3a member and renowned sleep researcher Professor Jim Horne.



Kevin Reynolds is a passionate naturalist who volunteers with his local wildlife trust. Some of you may remember Kevin's Zoom talk on Dragonflies and Damselflies in 2020, which was very well received, and following requests from several members, we have invited him back. He is pleased to be able to speak to us face to face about another of his wildlife interests, namely bats.

There are 13 species of bat in the UK, and they make up one third of British mammals. Kevin will accompany his talk with some stunning photographs of bats from both the UK and around the world. The most common bat in the UK is the Pipistrelle, which despite its small size, eats between 2,000 and 3,000 midges per night. If Kevin's previous talk is anything to go by, this promises to be an entertaining and fascinating insight into the lives of these nocturnal flying mammals.

Days of Interest Group – an April trip to Nottinghamshire

We did not venture very far afield in April and spent our day in Nottinghamshire visiting the homes of two literary giants.



Our first stop was at Newstead Abbey which was, for a short time, home to the talented but notorious 19th century poet Lord Byron *(left, as painted in 1813 by Thomas Phillips).* He was once described by his lover Lady Caroline Lamb as "mad, bad and dangerous to know".

Byron inherited the estate and his title when he was ten, but instead of it being the luxurious dwelling that he and his mother expected, it was in a very run down state. It was for some years rented out and eventually sold. The house itself incorporates part of a pre-reformation priory, including the Prior's lodgings and the cloisters. We had a very informative guide-led tour of the house.



In the afternoon we moved on to Eastwood, birthplace of another notorious author, D.H. Lawrence (pictured on the left in his passport photograph). You have all probably heard of Lady Chatterley's Lover, even if you haven't read it.

The D.H. Lawrence Birthplace Museum is located in the house where Lawrence was born in 1885. It was built in the 19th century to house working class miners and is in sharp contrast to the grandeur of Newstead Abbey. We again had a guided tour and found out about the importance of Lawrence's mother in his success and that of his siblings.

Travel Group Trip to Vienna, April 2023

Empress Sisi, and is one of Europe's most impressive Baroque complexes, surrounded by splendid

Members of the Travel Group have recently returned from a most enjoyable trip to the stunning city of Vienna.

Our guide, Giuseppina, introduced us to many examples which demonstrate the imperial grandeur of the powerful Habsburg dynasty. The vast Schönbrunn Palace (*pictured right*) was the birthplace of Emperor Franz Joseph, the summer residence of

gardens and built to rival the Palace of Versailles. Many of the group enjoyed visits to the concerts performed usually in The Orangery, celebrating works of Mozart and Strauss. Mozart himself performed here in 1786. Within the palace grounds is also the home of the world's oldest working zoo!

Within the city centre, we were spoilt for choice for places to visit. We were impressed with the external architecture of the Baroque Karlskirche (*pictured left*), with its great dome and two giant columns. Inside it is adorned with marble stonework and wall paintings with regular splashes of gold. Vienna's important landmark, the Romanesque and Gothic St. Stephen's Cathedral (*pictured below*), with its patterned

roof tiles, was equally impressive. The Museum Quarter, originally the former imperial court stables, now encompasses 60 cultural institutions, celebrating all types of art, literature, music, fashion, dance, and much, much more. The Hofburg Palace was the power-house of the Habsburg Empire. It was once the imperial winter residence and now stands as the official seat of the Austrian President. Not surprisingly, a visit to the Spanish Riding School was a must for some of the group, for a tour of the stables or to watch a training session of the graceful white stallions set to classical Viennese music.

> Outside of the city, the famous Prater is one of the oldest amusement parks in the world, and with its 200 foot high Ferris Wheel (*pictured left*), is one of Vienna's most iconic symbols, well remembered in the 1949 film *The Third Man.* Another popular place to visit was The Belvedere complex which consists

of two baroque palaces (the Upper and Lower Belvedere), the Orangery and the palace stables, and is home to the largest collection of Gustav Klimt paintings.

No visit to Vienna is complete without a cruise on the Danube. Following a tour of the magnificent Benedictine Melk Abbey, with its domed roof, numerous treasures and a huge library housing medieval manuscripts, we took a leisurely cruise, in the rain, through the Wachau Valley to the pretty little town of Krems, for a well-deserved melange and slice (or two) of sacher torte and apfel studel.....When in Vienna....it would be rude not to!

Loughborough University Research Project: Loughborough Digital Challenges Among Older Adults

Jikun Yin, a researcher in Loughborough University's Design School, is exploring how inclusive design can help older adults gain digital competence.

Research has shown that older adults in the UK who lack life essential digital skills (EDS) are unable to take full advantage of online services provided by government and society, and become confused when using an application or web interface. Compared to young people, many older adults lack confidence and motivation to develop digital competence, and tend to underestimate their ability to learn to interact with mobile and computer devices. Jikun cites a 2021 survey by Lloyd's Bank which found that 59% of people aged 65 or over do not have life EDS, compared with 24% of the total UK population. Thus, since the UK government adopted a 'Digital by Default' strategy in 2012, older people have suffered digital exclusion disproportionately compared to younger adults.

Jikun's study focuses on the elderly who do not have basic digital skills, with the aim of discovering how inclusive design can be used to improve their digital competence. Questions she hopes to answer include:

- How do older people learn digital technologies to develop digital competence?
- What are the current dilemmas faced by older people when using digital services, and in which specific categories?
- What are the skills they are lacking? Can they improve their digital competence by training?

Jikun would really like to get in touch with older people, to discuss the problems they face when using websites and social media and to help them with online software such as communication software (WhatsApp, Snapchat, Telegram) information software (Facebook, Instagram, Twitter) and online services (Gov.uk and some social welfare official websites). This could really help those struggling with 'digital age' technology!

Phase 4: The "Reinvent & Rewire Phase". What's the purpose? How do I squeeze the juice out of retirement? Helping others? Teach others how to use iPhones and iPads. How to paint, how to mend bicycles. English as a second language. Learn a language....

Do you recognise a thinly disguised u3a in Phase 4? Are we not fortunate?

Peppermint Billy was the last man publicly hanged in Leicester in 1856. William 'Peppermint Billy' Brown had previously been transported to Van Diemen's Land for theft, spent seven years in an asylum, and then after spending thirteen years on the other side of the world, he made his way back to England and back to Leicestershire. Eight weeks later, he was executed why did he come back? Was he truly guilty of murder?
