First, a big THANK YOU to everybody who came to the AGM. And an extra big thank you to those who couldn't come but took their time to nominate a proxy. Because a proxy counts in the attendance figures, it ensured that we were quorate. Much as we all love AGMs, I'm sure we wouldn't have wanted to do it again!

You'll already have seen our newly replenished Committee on the first page: Sam Hardwick and Jennie Lock, co-opted members who were formally elected, along with a brand-new Trustee, Char March. A warm welcome to them all. We still have two vacancies on the Committee, and we can co-opt three more, so do get in touch if you'd like to be involved in running our u3a, or if you'd just like to come and see what we get up to.



Two of our Trustees came to the end of their tenure this year: Margaret Kelvey and Helen Reid. It's always sad to say goodbye to valued committee members, but I'm really pleased that both Margaret and Helen will continue in their roles, Margaret as part of our Speaker Programme team and Helen as our Newsletter Editor.

We had one motion this year. Members agreed to increase the annual subscription for postal members to £25. I'm sure you'll be aware how much printing and postage costs have risen, so the Committee felt it was only fair to the rest of our members to pass on some of the cost. Three years ago, we asked those who didn't have email to pay an extra £5 on top of their subscription. Then the cost to our u3a was around £11; now it costs about £17.50, so the additional £5 that postal members will be paying from August will still mean a subsidy of over 40%.

Arley may look familiar as it's also a popular film and television location. Hosting popular programmes from The Antiques Roadshow, Coronation Street and Hollyoaks, to Disney's Evermoor and more recently Peaky Blinders and the Netflix blockbuster, Fool Me Once.

This visit is now open to all Cu3a members. The Gardener's Kitchen Café uses locally sourced ingredients and produce grown in the Arley Kitchen Garden and welcomes groups for coffees, lunches or afternoon teas. The Gift Shop offers a browse round a delightful selection of gifts.

Days of Interest Group Visit to Lincoln

For the first coach trip of the year, which was to Lincoln, our larger than usual coach was very nearly full. We had two drop off points in Lincoln, firstly in the Castle and Cathedral area, at the top of the hill, and secondly at the bottom of the hill in the shopping area.

About half of the group had booked to visit the castle, so our first adventure was to find the castle and then pick up the tickets – more tricky than you might think. Once in the castle we each explored the site at our own pace. The views from the outer wall were fabulous, particularly those towards the cathedral and the countryside. Lincolnshire is generally really quite flat, and I now understand that



this was one of the reasons why so many WWII bombers were flown from this area. The castle is also home to copies of the Magna Carta and the two following Charters of the Forest. You can also visit the Victorian prison and sit in the chapel pews, designed to keep prisoners apart during worship. Finally there are roaring dragons, Lucy and Norman, bursting through the castle walls.

Other members of the group went to explore the majestic cathedral, currently displaying a 13 metre long table made from ancient fossilized wood. This is in addition to the stunning stone work and windows, and very imposing exterior. At least one of our group also took an interesting trip around the Guildhall.



Having said that Lincolnshire is largely flat, those of us that had left the coach in the Castle and Cathedral area now had to make our way to the shopping area and pickup point via the aptly named Steep Hill. We were pleased to be walking down the hill rather than up. Along the route to the main shopping area there are lots of interesting small shops and some unusual (experimental sonic) busking.

The city centre itself was also pleasantly full of a variety of shops, from big chains to small independents. It was good to see so few boarded up shops. We were also blessed with fairly cool but dry and bright weather.

Our next two trips are to Bletchley Park, home of the code breakers and York. Both trips are now full.

Robert's Recommended Reads

Cu3a member Robert Jackson's recommendations for April are books from David Lodge and Colm Tóibín.

The "Campus Trilogy" by David Lodge

published 1975 to 1988.

David Lodge wrote many critically acclaimed books, both fiction and non-fiction. Many of his books draw on his experiences as a senior academic, both in the UK and in the US, particularly his "Campus" trilogy. The three books are best read in order of publication:-

- 1. Changing Places (1975) introduces the irrepressible Morris Zapp, US university Professor and serial philanderer. Zapp swaps academic locations with mild mannered, University of Rummidge lecturer Phillip Swallow, when they temporarily exchange 'Schools'. Pitched into the flashy, aggressive and self confident world of the US West Coast, Swallow has to adapt quickly to his new, somewhat scary circumstances. Zapp, meanwhile, soon gets to grips with and exploits the opportunities presented by his arrival at Rummidge. In this clever, intricate book, Lodge creates a wonderful blend of humour and drama and delivers a laugh out loud experience.
- 2. **Small World** (1984) follows Zapp and Swallow as they crisscross the globe to attend a sequence of conferences. Once again, Lodge's great skill is to take the normally mundane world of university life and craft a captivating collection of bitter sweet events.
- 3. *Nice Work* (1988). Vic Wilcox is an entrepreneur and successful businessman who is persuaded, reluctantly, to become involved with the University of Rummidge's Industry Liaison Programme. Perhaps the funniest book of the Campus Trilogy, *Nice Work* once again pitches us into the unpredictable world of Swallow, Zapp and colleagues. In 1989 *Nice Work* was made into a mini-series for TV, starring the excellent Warren Clarke, perfectly cast as Vic Wilcox.

The Testament of Mary by Colm Tóibín


published in 2013

Born in County Wexford in 1955, Colm Tóibín is one the most prolific and respected Irish writers of modern times.

The Testament of Mary is a bold and perhaps controversial account of Christ and the crucifixion, told from the perspective of his aging mother, Mary, the narrator. Mary clings to the truth of her son's difficult life and terrible death, as the myths surrounding him grow and expand among Christ's followers.

Mary, a mother whose son was taken from her and lost, now lives in a kind of self imposed exile, watched by those who seek to preserve and write about the special sanctity of her son's memory. Mary tells the reader her own story in which we learn of the ambivalence she feels for her son's followers, describing them as misfits and malcontents. Mary feels estranged when her son sheds his boyhood identity and becomes someone else, "his voice all false and his tone all stilted".

In just over a hundred pages, Tóibín creates an enigmatic, thought provoking work. I loved it, but I recommended it to a practising Catholic friend of mine who considered it utter tosh! Read it for yourself and you'll immediately see why such polar reactions are engendered by this book.

What use are magnetic materials when trying to reach Net Zero? Professor Kelly Morrison, Department of Physics

Whether you realise it or not, magnetic materials are ubiquitous in modern day technologies.

Professor Morrison will discuss the unique properties of different classes of magnetic materials and how they could be used to reduce energy consumption. She will explore whether – by designing more efficient refrigeration technologies or alternative approaches to harvesting waste energy – these unique properties offer opportunities we can exploit. She will talk about the techniques that she and other physicists use to probe these materials to understand what makes them work and how we can better engineer them for energy-related applications.

What can (ultra)sound waves tell us about mayonnaise and aircraft wings? Professor Valerie Pinfield, Department of Chemical Engineering

Those of us with good hearing are familiar with using sound to interpret the environment around us — whether that is sensing the size of the space we are in, identifying the location of a source of sound or recognising the plink of a tap dripping into water.

However, working at frequencies higher than the human ear can hear, we can also use sound – or ultrasound – to learn about the properties of materials that sound waves travel through or bounce off. By doing so, we can create better products, protect against material failure by checking for defects, and design novel materials.

Professor Pinfield will show how waves are scattered by small objects in their path and how building models can help us use these scattering phenomena to provide information from ultrasonic measurements. She will explore what mayonnaise, fibre composite components for aircraft and stealth coatings for submarines all have in common.
